

Navy to 'ram' US warships in contested waters

➤ Both China and Russia are rising global powers making significant investments in their own military to counteract our conventional advantage. North Korea and Iran are rogue states that mistreat their citizens and that could act out in unpredictable ways. Iran could block maritime chokepoints, bringing global trade to a halt.

The Navy the Nation Needs




- Navy is busy protecting our freedom throughout the world and is doing so with the smallest number of ships since before WWI.
- The most recent Force Structure
 Assessment, released December 2016,
 recommends a fleet of 355 ships, as does
 our Maritime Policy report.
- The Navy plans to increase the number of its deployed ships by more than 20 percent over the next five years, providing the U.S more firepower and assets in the Middle East and Asia to meet security demands.

The Value of a 355-Ship Navy



- Even though the fleet is smaller than it has been, we have the same number of ships deployed, leading to readiness issues, fatigue and backlogs for repair work at shipyards.
- High deterrent value; our Navy is present worldwide.
- Our fleet is imperative to ensure capabilities for:
- Conflict Deterrence
- Forward Presence
- Maritime Security
- Protection of international sea lanes
- > Humanitarian assistance/ disaster response
- ➤ While our fleet size declines, our global trade increases:
- > 90% of worldwide trade is transported by sea.
- Thank you to Congress for codifying this requirement in law.

30-Year Shipbuilding Plan



- ➤ Unless Congress increases shipbuilding funds, the Navy will not be able to reach the right mix of ships in 2034.
- For FY20, the right level is \$26.7B and at least 13 new ships, but the current budget request falls short, which means FY21 will need to be funded at an even higher level.

Invest in the Future of the Navy



- With technology changing at exponential rates, the Navy must look towards the future and consider the right investments for an increasingly digital and connected world. We urge the Navy to consider:
- How to confront adversaries in this new environment.
- How to recruit, train, and retain the next generation.
- How can investments in new weapons technology provide cost savings over the long term.

The Top Priority: Steady and Stable Budget Funding



- We thank Congress for eliminating threat of sequestration.
- > No more continuing resolutions.
- > Return to a regular appropriations process.



Overall Priorities

Columbia-Class Submarine Program

 The Ohio-class replacement will provide the most survivable leg of our nuclear triad, carrying over 70% of our deployed warheads.

 We must fund the Columbia-class submarine, crucial to deterrence while growing the fleet and cannot afford any delays to this program.

Overall Priorities

Protect Readiness

- Lack of spare parts, delayed maintenance on aircraft and surface ships.
- Despite improving budgets continued stable funding is required to fly adequate training flight hours, eroding carefully-honed skills.
- Shipyards have a significant backlog of ship and submarine maintenance due to sequestration cuts and continuing resolutions (CRs).
- Surface ship training required to develop and maintain ship handling skills.

Overall Priorities

Research and Development

The Navy must continue to invest increasing funds in technology and force structure innovation to prepare for the future fight.

The Navy League Recommends



- > Steady and stable budgets.
- Funding SCN budget at \$26.7B to reach a fleet of 355 with the right mix of ships in the 2030s.
- Ensuring the Columbia-class submarine is well-funded and on schedule.
- > Investing in readiness.

In Conclusion



- Our national fleet size is smaller today than needed during a time of global instability.
- Building and maintaining a fleet of 355 ships requires the support of Congress.
- Congress must pass regular budgets in a timely fashion.
